Consequently, a law enacted in 1917, taking effect the following year, reunited these three municipalities into a single, unified Municipality of Monaco. Since that time, the Monegasque territory has remained administratively undivided, with its current city districts primarily serving statistical and urban planning purposes rather than as independent municipal entities. This unified approach has allowed for a cohesive development strategy, enabling the Principality to manage its limited space with remarkable efficiency and foresight.

For the purposes of urban planning, a sovereign ordinance issued in 1966 further refined the internal organization of the principality. This ordinance categorized Monaco into "reserved sectors," areas where the existing character and architectural heritage are to be meticulously preserved, and "scheduled districts," which are subject to specific planning regulations allowing for controlled development and modernization. This detailed approach, with subsequent revisions over the years, currently outlines two reserved sectors and seven scheduled districts as of 2013, a testament to Monaco's proactive stance on urban management.

While operating as a single municipality, Monaco is commonly understood and organized into a number of traditional quarters and modern geographic areas. The most frequently cited traditional quarters that visitors and residents alike recognize are Monaco-Ville, La Condamine, Monte Carlo, and Fontvieille. Additionally, Moneghetti is widely acknowledged as an effective fifth quarter due to its distinct characteristics and recognized identity within the urban fabric. These traditional distinctions offer a valuable framework for navigating and appreciating the unique charm of each area.

As of recent administrative divisions, Monaco is further organized into ten official districts or wards. These divisions are primarily utilized for statistical and organizational purposes, providing a more granular understanding of the Principality's diverse urban mosaic. Many of these districts include areas that have been developed through ambitious land reclamation projects, showcasing Monaco's continuous drive to expand and modernize its territory.
