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CHAPTER ONE: The Genesis of Cricket

The earliest definitive written reference to "creckett" appears in a legal deposition from Guildford, Surrey, dated January 1598 (New Style). In this court case, a 59-year-old coroner, John Derrick, testified that he had played cricket on a parcel of land when he was a boy, around 1550. This testimony provides concrete evidence that the sport was being played by children in southeast England by the mid-16th century. The reference suggests cricket was initially a children's game, a notion further supported by a 1611 English-French dictionary that defined "crosse" as "the crooked staff wherewith boys play at cricket".

The etymology of the word "cricket" itself is a subject of fascinating debate, with several theories pointing to its linguistic roots. One widely accepted theory suggests a derivation from the Middle Dutch word "krick(-e)," meaning a stick, or the Old English "cricc" or "cryce," also meaning a crutch or staff. Given the strong medieval trade links between southeast England and the County of Flanders, where Middle Dutch was spoken, this linguistic connection seems plausible. Another possibility ties into the Middle Dutch word "krickstoel," referring to a long, low stool used for kneeling in church, which bore a resemblance to the early two-stump wicket. The Old French word "criquet," meaning a type of club or stick, is also a contender. Interestingly, the word for the insect "cricket" comes from a different origin, Old French "criquer," related to the sound it makes, and is generally unrelated to the game.

By the early 17th century, cricket began its transition from a children's pastime to an adult sport. The earliest known organized match took place around 1610 in Chevening, Kent, between teams representing the "Downs" and the "Weald." Further evidence of adult participation emerged in 1611, when two men in Sidlesham, Sussex, were prosecuted for playing cricket on a Sunday instead of attending church. This suggests that the game was not only being played by adults but was also gaining enough traction to occasionally supersede religious obligations – a testament to its growing appeal.

The spread of cricket during this period was inherently limited by the constraints of travel and communication. However, it steadily gained popularity within its heartland of Kent, Sussex, and Surrey. These counties were not only the birthplace of the sport but also its earliest centers of development. The game continued to be played in village settings, evolving organically with local variations in rules and customs. Early cricket balls were likely made of blackthorn wood covered in leather, while bats were simple wooden implements, often curved like a modern hockey stick, which proved effective against the ball being delivered along the ground. Wickets, in these nascent stages, were likely informal targets like tree stumps or stools.

The 17th century saw the gradual development of village cricket, with informal matches becoming a common sight in the rural landscape. This period also witnessed the emergence of what are believed to be the earliest "county teams" after the Restoration in 1660. These teams were not formalized clubs as we understand them today, but rather collections of local experts, often employed by gentry and nobility who were keen gamblers and patrons of the game. The stakes on these early matches could be surprisingly high, indicating the increasing importance and competitive nature of the sport. For instance, a "great match" played in Sussex in 1697 was contested for 50 guineas a side.
