This temporary, though critical, reliance on marine transport underscored the ongoing need for further pipeline expansion to create a more direct and efficient route. In its first full year of operation, IPL shipped an impressive 30.6 million barrels of oil, a clear testament to the pipeline's immediate impact and the burgeoning demand for Western Canadian crude.

The early years of IPL were characterized by rapid expansion to meet ever-growing demand. In 1953, just three years after the initial line became operational, the pipeline system was extended from Superior to Sarnia, Ontario. This extension, which entered service in 1954, was a crucial development. It provided a direct, all-pipeline connection between the Alberta oil fields and Canada's petrochemical heartland in Ontario, eliminating the need for the Great Lakes tanker shipments and significantly streamlining the transportation process. By 1956, IPL proudly owned and operated what was then considered the longest crude oil pipeline in the world.
