Moreover, 6.7% of students reported skipping school during that same period due to feeling unsafe.

Despite the persistent concern, overall rates of school violence in the United States have actually decreased significantly since the 1990s. For instance, the total victimization rate at school for students aged 12 to 18 decreased from 55.0 victimizations per 1,000 students in 2013 to 20.0 per 1,000 in 2023. Similarly, the rate of total victimization at school decreased from 30 to 7 victimizations per 1,000 students between 2019 and 2021. This is good news, certainly, but the nuanced reality is that while some forms of crime have declined, others persist, and the impact on individuals and the school community remains profound.

For example, a 2021-2022 survey found that 67% of public schools reported at least one violent incident, such as a fight, on campus. Middle schools, in particular, appear

to be disproportionately affected, with 90% reporting at least one violent incident in the 2021-2022 school year, compared to elementary and high schools. This highlights the need for targeted interventions and strategies across different grade levels.

The Pervasive Problem of Bullying

Students aged 12-18 reported various types, including being the subject of rumors or lies (13.4%), being made fun of, called names, or insulted (13.0%), being pushed, shoved, tripped, or spit on (5.3%), being excluded from social groups (5.2%), being threatened (3.9%), being coerced into doing unwanted things (1.9%), and having property destroyed on purpose (1.4%). Girls are more likely to be targets of rumors, while boys are more often physically bullied.

With the rise of digital technology, cyberbullying has become another significant concern, with 22% of bullied students reporting that it occurred online or via text in 2021-2022. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported in 2019 that 15% of students had been cyberbullied. This digital extension of bullying adds another layer of complexity to school safety efforts, demanding new strategies and awareness.

The consequences of bullying are far-reaching, affecting both the immediate school environment and the long-term well-being of individuals. Victims of bullying are more likely to experience anxiety, depression, low self-esteem, and even suicidal thoughts and actions.
