This impressive aircraft, capable of carrying numerous passengers, set speed and distance records in April 1918 with a flight from Santa Barbara to San Diego. The F-1 initially found use in aerial sightseeing and the early film industry, even attracting interest from the U.S. Navy. However, the conclusion of World War I flooded the market with surplus aircraft, effectively stifling demand for the F-1 and a subsequent single-seat biplane, the S-1, leading to the closure of Loughhead Aircraft in 1921 due to financial strain.

Meanwhile, another aviation pioneer, Glenn L. Martin, was charting his own course in the skies. Born in Iowa in 1886, Martin's journey into aviation began with a childhood fascination for kites and sails. He built his first plane in an old Methodist church he rented in Los Angeles, California, in 1912. To finance his burgeoning enterprise, Martin

became an accomplished barnstorming pilot, performing daring stunts at fairs and airfields. He even leveraged his flying skills for a role as a dashing hero in a 1915 silent film starring Mary Pickford, showcasing his entrepreneurial spirit and knack for self-promotion.

On August 16, 1912, Martin officially founded the Glenn L. Martin Company in Los Angeles. His early focus was on building military training aircraft. In September 1916, he accepted a merger offer from the Wright Company, creating the Wright-Martin Aircraft Company. This merger, however, proved to be short-lived and unsuccessful. Consequently, Glenn Martin departed and established a second Glenn L. Martin Company on September 10, 1917, headquartered in Cleveland, Ohio.

The new Glenn L. Martin Company quickly made its mark. In Cleveland, with the backing of local investors, Martin's company produced the city's first airplane in 1918. The company became known for its innovative designs, including mail airplanes and a commercially successful bomber, the Martin Bomber (MB-1 and MB-2). Martin's pioneering work also extended to developing hydraulic landing gear. The military's demand for aircraft during World War I provided a significant boost to the company.

While both the Loughhead brothers and Glenn L. Martin faced their share of challenges and setbacks in these early days, their individual efforts laid crucial groundwork. The Loughheads, despite their initial company's financial struggles, demonstrated an early aptitude for innovative aircraft design and passenger transport. Glenn L.
