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CHAPTER ONE: Geography and Climate of Morocco

The Rif act as a natural boundary, separating the Mediterranean coastal plains from the interior.

Between these mountain ranges and along the coasts lie fertile plains and plateaus. These areas, particularly in the north and west, receive sufficient rainfall to support

agriculture and a higher human population density. The Gharb plain, in the northwest, is one of the most fertile regions, fed by the Oued Sebou river. Other important plains include the Saïs plain around Fes and Meknes, and the Haouz plain around Marrakech. These areas, while extensively cultivated, still retain pockets of natural habitat that are important for wildlife.

South and east of the Atlas Mountains, the landscape transforms dramatically into the arid and semi-arid regions that mark the transition to the Sahara Desert. While seemingly barren, the desert supports a surprising variety of life, from specially adapted plants to elusive mammals, reptiles, and birds. The pre-Saharan steppe, the zone between the High Atlas and the true desert, is characterized by sparse vegetation and is home to nomadic peoples and hardy wildlife.

Morocco's climate is as varied as its geography. The north and coastal regions experience a Mediterranean climate, with hot, dry summers and mild, wet winters. Rainfall is higher in the mountains, particularly in the Rif and Middle Atlas, where it can fall as snow at higher elevations. The interior plains have a more continental climate, with greater temperature extremes between summer and winter. As one moves south towards the Sahara, the climate becomes increasingly arid, with very low rainfall and high temperatures, especially in the summer.

This interplay of topography and climate creates a mosaic of microclimates and habitats across the country.
