For those arriving from certain countries, a **Yellow Fever vaccination certificate** may be required. This is especially important if you're heading to the Amazon or coastal regions. While not always checked, it's better to have it on hand—some national parks won't let you in without it.

One often-overlooked detail is **proof of onward travel**. While not always enforced, immigration officers can ask for a return ticket or proof of travel to another country. If you're flying one-way, a bus ticket out of Colombia or a flexible flight booking can save you from last-minute scrambling.

Finally, keep a digital copy of your passport, visa, and travel documents. Losing your passport abroad is stressful, but having backups can speed up the replacement
